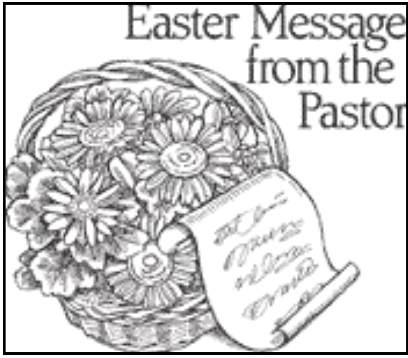

Another Holy Week will soon be upon us. This is the most important week in Christianity, but often you would never know it. We live in a culture that is at the same time numb to death and scared to death about death. Many people like to go straight from Palm Sunday to Easter. They try to forget the betrayal and the death that happens in between. There is no way around it. Unfortunately, in our culture the story of Jesus' death and resurrection has been relegated to a motivational pep talk right next to the poster of the cat that says, "Hang in there." This is when our Lutheran "Theology of the Cross" is so important. Far too often we want to just talk about the cross rather than experience it. We want to do that because the cross is death. The cross is the place that most reminds us we are not in control. We die to ourselves and live in Christ. We would like to avoid this because it's extremely uncomfortable. But we can't. We would like Jesus to be just a little pick-me-up on an as-needed basis, but he's not. We would like this to simply be like getting a correct answer on Jeopardy, but it's not. It is a matter of death and life.

St. Francis of Assisi spoke of "sister death." He could embrace his mortality only because he knew that what he called his "second death" meant nothing because of his "first death." Dylan Thomas wrote, "Do not go gentle into that good night... Rage, rage against the dying of the light." (You may recognize this from a pharmaceutical company advertisement). The poem urges us to hold on to life. But there is a difference between affirming life and fearing death. True life, life in Christ comes through the cross. It comes when we relinquish our lives. It seems counterintuitive, to say the least. But this is how we can say with the Apostle Paul, "To live is Christ, to die is gain."

It's exceedingly appropriate that Easter falls so close to April Fool's Day. Our faith takes us beyond logic. It seems foolish to have an instrument of torture as the symbol of our faith. But it's only through the cross that the empty tomb takes on life-changing meaning. It's when we realize that we are utterly dependent on Christ that we begin to understand our life as a Christian. A theology of the cross doesn't pretend suffering and pain and death aren't there. We go through those things knowing that we can totally trust Jesus. May God bless you through death and life this Holy Week.

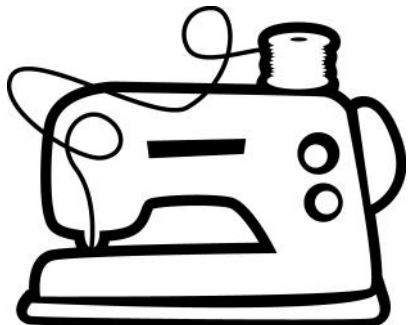

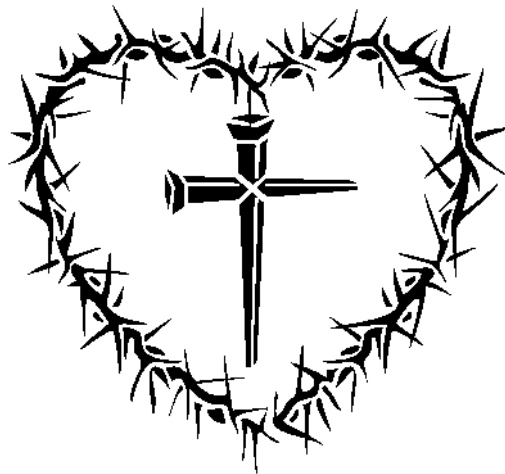

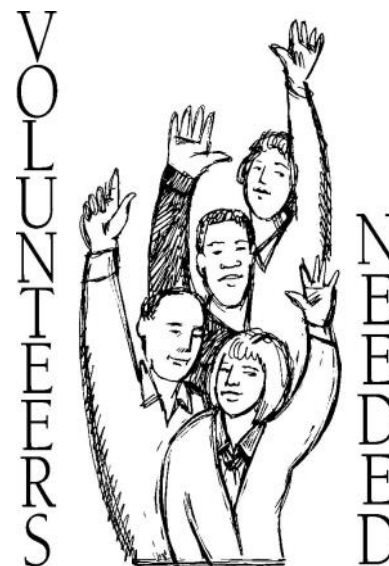
